About the Multicultural Leadership Program

- MCLP is an intense, professional development curriculum that provides a framework for participants to learn and practice becoming better leaders.
- MCLP cultivates emerging leaders who understand the power of diversity — leaders who want to work with people of all ages, cultures, and walks of life to strengthen and support our community.



Servant-Leadership

Servant-leadership is the foundational core of MCLP.

The program is based on key servant leadership principles:

- A servant-leader starts with a deep desire to serve.
- True leadership emerges when the servant-leader has the courage to step forward and lead.
- The best test of a servant-leader is: “do those served grow as persons?”

Self-Awareness Builds Self-Confidence

MCLP is designed to help each participant find the leader within by answering three questions and testing those answers throughout the curriculum experiences.

- Who are you?
- What are your strengths and passions?
- What are you going to do now?

Only through knowing oneself can a leader be effective in challenges, crises or celebrations.

MCLP’s Approach to Leadership Development

Experiential learning is the cornerstone of MCLP. The program provides a safe environment where values, assumptions and perspectives can be tested. Mistakes can be made, limits can be pushed. Participants learn to recover from mistakes and succeed despite challenges.

- The MCLP class includes 26 diverse individuals who meet from the end of July to the following March. Participants must attend two learning events per month: one Thursday evening and one all-day Saturday.
- MCLP curriculum focuses on:
 - Professional Leadership Development,
 - Community Involvement,
 - Mentoring and Networking.
- Panel discussions with community leaders include topics such as:
 - Health care.
 - Politics and Social justice.
 - Education.
- Simulation exercises help participants experience life through the lens of others.
 - Poverty Simulation: living four weeks in simulated poverty during a four-hour exercise.
 - Crisis Simulation: working in an emergency situation with high-stress, life-or-death situations.
